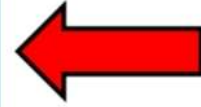

### .... RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS

#### Rector's Ramblings – Harvest October 2025

***We plough the fields, and scatter the good seed on the land;***

***But it is fed and watered by God's almighty hand:***

***He sends the snow in winter, the warmth to swell the grain,***

***The breezes and the sunshine, and soft refreshing rain.***

***He only is the maker of all things near and far;***

***He paints the wayside flower, He lights the evening star;***

***The winds and waves obey Him, by Him the birds are fed;***

***Much more to us, His children, He gives our daily bread.***

***We thank Thee, then, O Father, for all things bright and good,***

***The seed time and the harvest, our life, our health, our food;***

***No gifts have we to offer, for all Thy love imparts,***

***But that which Thou desirest, our humble, thankful hearts.***

This must be one of the finest hymns in our hymnal—though, sadly, we do not sing it often enough. Its verses echo those well-loved words from *Ecclesiastes*, which we so often hear at funerals:

***For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: a time to plant, and a time to harvest.***

By the time you read this, much of this year's harvest will already have been gathered in. What began in the warmth of early summer now gives way to thoughts of winter ahead, and the first stirrings of planning for next year.

The hymn reminds us that working the land is always a partnership—between the soil and the seasons, the farmers who labour, and, for many of us, God himself, the maker and giver of life. In the natural world around us, we glimpse the hand of God at work. It also reminds us that “our daily bread” is not only the fruit of the harvest but the health of our bodies, the strength of our communities, and the nurture of our spirits and souls.

The hymn reminds us that whilst we might turn to God in our darkest hour, harvest is the time to turn to God in simple thankfulness, rejoicing in the gifts God has given and in the work of those in our farm community tend the land.

The hymn concludes with words that sum it all up so perfectly:

***All good gifts around us are sent from heaven above; then thank the Lord, O thank the Lord, for all His love.***

Amen to that.



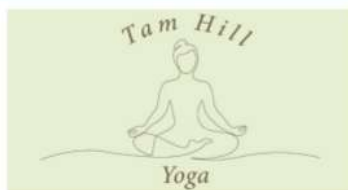
